It allows law enforcement to perform compliance checks in our establishments that sell alcohol and mandates all store employees that sell beer or directly supervise the sale of beer to attend training and become certified. We will be working to ensure that both aspects of this program are being met in an effort to help reduce alcohol consumption by minors in our City. Hey everyone, spring is here. It's time to put away our winter coats and slip into light jackets. It's time for sitting on the porch and watching the cars go by and working in our gardens. It's time for the kids to be outside running through the sprinklers, riding bicycles, and playing in the dirt. For the officers at the Heber City Police Department, we are gearing up to take reports of lost or stolen bicycles and scooters. This is the type of call for service we dread. We hate having to take a report from

a child that has saved their own money to buy the perfect bicycle, only to have it stolen. Here are a few quick and easy tips.

Put away your bicycles, scooters and toys; even during the day but especially at night. Don't leave the temptation on your front lawn, it's just too easy to pick up a bike and ride off. I know they are a hassle, but a good bike lock and/or chain will make it more difficult to steal your bicycle.



Register your bicycle at the Heber City Police Department. Come to our department at 301 South Main Street and pick up a bicycle registration form. We will give you a HCPD bicycle registration sticker to put on your bicycle, so if we do find it, we can return your bicycle to you as soon as possible. You should also write down your serial numbers. You can find the serial number by turning your bicycle upside down and locating it on the pedal housing. This will help us verify that the bicycle we find belongs to you.

We are also very excited to see you wearing your helmets this year as we patrol your streets and neighborhoods. Have a great and safe summer.
